

#### DOUG LEVER

Doug first started out in 1958 driving trucks locally around Melbourne then drove interstate mainly between Wollongong and Melbourne, for various trucking companies.

In 1961, he worked for Ruttys Bus Service in Wollongong, on local route services. In 1962, he purchased his first truck, an International traybody, carting bricks from Wollongong to Sydney. He then bought a Bedford Semitrailer and operated between Port Kembla and Melbourne. He then bought a 180 Inter and operated to Adelaide and Perth.

Doug & Dawn were married in 1963 and in 1964 Doug sold his trucking business and drove for Watt's Bus Service doing route service work, then worked for a local trucking firm called M.H.P.

In 1967 he decided to go back into business again and purchased another International tipper truck and contracted within Canberra on the Lake Burley Griffith excavation programme. On completion of this contract, he then purchased a Volvo Semi Trailer and carted coal between Appin and Port Kembla, and during the quite periods, worked casually for Pleasure Tours of Wollongong and did his first apprenticeship to Central Australia in late 1968. For the next 2 years, he continued to operate tours for Pleasure Tours to Central Australia and Western Australia. His trucking business continued to expand, purchasing Kenworth trucks to operate contracts from Metal Manufacturers at Port Kembla carting copper to Melbourne and Adelaide, Henry Jones — tin IXL products from Melbourne, wine from Adelaide and carbon black between Sydney and Brisbane.

In 1977, the Lever family decided that it was time for a complete change, and in October 1977, purchased Quodling Bros Bus Service, which operated 11 buses on local route and school services between Queanbeyan and Canberra. Doug then decided there was a market for a coach business operating to Central Australia and purchased a Domino in November 1977. Both the route, school and touring business continued to grow and by 1990, he had 42 vehicles operating these services.

In July 1990, Deane's Pioneer Tours purchased the route and school services and Doug kept his coach business and 2 school charter services, and now operates 12 coaches.

Dawn is still managing the office side of the business and his daughter Karen retired in March 91, after 10 years as Operations Manager, as young "Todd" was due to arrive in June.

Brett has been with his fathers company since 1985 and now does the majority of the long distance tours.

Doug still loves to drive his "Eagle", and is out on the highway driving most of the time.

Doug attended the first Aldec reunion and has never missed a reunion since.
