Many of you would remember Noel and Isobelle from the Noel Fullarton Camel Farm out of Alice Springs.

John Gullock has written an interesting article on what he is up to working wise. Enjoy the irony of where our Country has headed over the past years that John has been working.

With my present employer Terry Plant Hire, every two years we get river rehabilitation work on river banks at various Coal mine sites near Moranbah 200kms west of Mackay. This time was slightly different being a construction site for what will become the largest open cut coal mine in Australia. It's called Caval Ridge, for BMA part of BHP Billiton. On site there are 3200 construction workers, construction due to be completed 2014 which includes haul roads, coal conveyers, infrastructure to process coal, rail line extension and coal loading facility and **my** little part, restoration of creek bed!!!! Total cost of construction 6 billion {approx]

To work on any coal mine site you need:

Two day induction Generic Coal License, completed in Melbourne. Full medical, including physiotherapist. Fit for Work certificate All this is required 2 weeks prior to being on site. We arrived midday Sunday and picked up a 4wheel drive hire utility all fitted out to mine specifications. Monday: Defensive driving course

Tuesday: Site inspection

Wednesday: Site induction 100 plus in class. Seated in the back I could not hear anything, unable to hear answers to questions so copied off person next to me!!! We corrected and ticked own answers!

Thursday: VOC [vehicle operator competency} to enable you to operate the excavator on site even though already have license to operate. 60 questions plus operating test, also VOC to operate light vehicle [work Ute} Part of reason for previous days defensive driving course.

Friday: Work Ute inspection. To obtain special sticker for windscreen.

Saturday: Mobile phones banned on site unless for special circumstances. After completing a 30 question test I was privileged to be permitted to use my mobile phone. A sticker of authorisation had to be displayed on helmet.

Sunday: DAY OFF!! Sick of all the BULLSHIT!

Monday: VOC for chainsaw. When asked what sort of chainsaw I told them it was an old 090 Stihl with a 4 foot bar and NO chain brake!! Seems like these guys have no sense of humour as I got a severe reprimand for this comment! After 30 questions and an inspection of our operating ability, {We already had chainsaw tickets} we obtained VOC for chainsaw.

Tuesday: START WORK!!! Every day you must blow in the breathalyser at the security gate and if you blow any numbers you get two choices, either the aisle seat or the window seat on the first plane out of there!! On site were 2 draglines which had been moved from Peak Downs mine, 19kms south, which took one month to walk them, each weigh 2500 tonnes worth 50million dollars each!

This is the strictest construction site in Australia! Very FRUSTRATING! Maybe carrying OH&S a bit far??

REMEMBER..... 30+ years ago... ?



Greg Reid Inducted into the Shell Rimula Wall of Fame at ReUnion 2013.

Greg Reid was initially employed driving buses for Peter Harding's father where he became well known for his excellent skills in developing the coach tour market and promting the companies product. Greg's knowledge and professionalism was a great asset to the team, He had a real passion for the bus and coach industry generally and loved promoting all facets of the Australian tourism industry.

Greg has held various roles working for the Harding family over the years predominantly driving coaches. He loved the open road and showing the diversity of the Australian landscape and culture to his passengers who came in from all corners of Australia and the world.

Greg is regarded by his peers as one of the leaders in his field due to his personal attention and care to make sure every little detail is perfect from his grooming right through to the cleanliness of the coach. It was always said that breakfast could be eaten off the floor of Greg's vehicles. They are always immaculately presented and he has great pride in showcasing this to his travellers.

For the past the13 years, Greg has worked for Grand Pacific Tours, predominantly driving their Gold Class Coach of which he has had complete control and management.

Grand Pacific Tours is 100% Australian owned and was started by Peter Harding in 1996. The Harding family is synonymous with the Australian and New Zealand coach holiday market.

Barbara Florence Connor (Barb) was born in 1949 in San Matoe, California USA. She came to Australia, her mother's birth place, to work as a Kindergarten Teacher to travel the big country in school holidays. Her first Centralian Safari Coach tour was as a passenger in 1970 with Grenda's Bus service. Lance Grenda was the Coach Captain with Peter Hopgood the courier. Passengers were unaccustomed to cooking on a camp fire, so they pooled their money and asked Barb to be their cook. She loved it and excelled at it. This led to a job, where she could both travel Australia and get paid for it. From that point Barb worked as Safari Cook for four years with Grendas during the school Holidays.



In December 1974 Barb started full time with Lance at Grenda's Bus Service as cook on camping tours. Her first tour was to Darwin. Cyclone Tracy hit Darwin on Christmas Eve 1974. They only reached Winton in Queensland before having to rewrite the itinerary so the tour could continue to a different destination. Lananda Tours was born on 1 July 1975. The old Bedford buses were replaced with a new Denning Coach. Lananda did their own tours as well as subcontract work for other companies such as Grenda's, AAT, Hoys, Evergreen and Camping Tours of Australia. In those days much of the work was with school groups. Lananda had overweight problems and, in 1979, Barbara helped Lance design a 15-foot trailer to help with this issue. A radical idea of side doors each side of the big trailer meant the camping gear could be packed separate from the kitchen and supplies. It worked very well. Lananda still had weight problems so a new 45 foot DenAir with a lazy axle was ordered and commissioned in February 1980. Barb continued to travel all over Australia with Lananda. The coach's lazy axle didn't help in deep sand but they always managed to reach their destination.

Barbara also planned tour itineraries which included leaving the coach at a main point and joining four wheel drive tours to Cape York, island stays on Fraser Island and Coach and Trailer trips by boat to Tasmania for a 28 day Tour. She compiled a commentary book for each tour they did in Australia. Lance Grenda was Barb's main influence in the industry. Such was their friendship that they worked together for 30 years. Lananda Tours was retired in 2003 but Barb did some school work and the occasional short trip around Victoria. Lance passed away in 2006. Barb retired at this time and returned to working in Primary Schools and volunteering at Abbeyfield.

Barbara says "Working in the coach industry from 1970 to 2000s was a wonderful time. The early days on the road were full of challenges, the mud, deep sand, dirt roads and dust in everything. The friends made in those days are still friends and help keep those good and bad times in mind with stories told at Australian Long Distance Coach Crew reunions".
